Down Hummingbird aka H-Bird

Last Monday evening, I looked out the patio door and saw an H-Bird lying on its side on the deck; I think it had flown into the glass. H-Bird was breathing but couldn't get off its side.

I carefully picked it up and held it upright. H-Bird's left wing was extended, the upper and lower parts of its beak were not aligned, its tongue was split, and H-Bird's breathing was sporadic. (I later read that hummingbird's tongues work because they are split.) I just held my hand so H-Bird was upright.

Mrs. Ames checked the web to see how to make nectar to feed hummingbirds and mixed four parts water with one part white sugar, and gave me a small spoon with some. H-Bird took some nectar and, after 15 minutes or so, did a couple of wing flapping tests but didn't lift off. But both wings seemed to be functional.

I got H-Bird to perch on the rim of my hat, set my hat on a chair, and went inside and checked H-Bird's status through the door every 5-10 minutes.

The third check revealed H-Bird had left its perch on my hat

FUN RUN, APRIL 29-MAY 1, 2022

On Friday morning shortly after 8:30 am, the following group of T-Birders left the parking lot of McDonalds and headed north on I-17. Ken & Iva Lane, Par Fenlon, Mike & Jeannie Wood, Don & Rosemary Henderson, Mike Doles & friend Richard, Tom & Yvonne Wagner and Gregg & Linda Thurston. Half way to Camp Verde Mike Doles T-Bird decided to stop running oops. Point broke but Mike being a good planned had an extra set, he was back on the road.

We turned off on HWY 179 through Sedona, and Hwy 89A north to Flagstaff through beautiful Oak Creek Canyon. After pit stops we went on to Williams

Where we met Russ & Margie Hanson at Cruisers Route 66 Café for lunch.

Then we headed to Ash fork, an historic 50" town. The town was established as a siding for the railroad in 1882 and name by F.W. Smith, railroad general superintendent, in reference to a thicket of ash trees at the site. Ash fork is known as "The Flagstone Capital of the world" due to the large number of stone quarries and stone yards. Some of which we saw as we drove through town. The town burned down in 1885 and was rebuilt on the other side of the tracks in 1907 and operated until 1948 by Fred Harvey Company. The Desoto's Salon originally a Texaco gas station an now a beauty/barber salon, has a Chrysler Desoto car on the roof which was once driven by Elvis Presley. In the filming of 1992's Universal Soldier portions of the town were purchased as sets, including an old motel, and were blown up for cinematic effect.


We exited west through Ash Fork, and then drove 25 miles of Old 1960's route 66 to Seligman. Along the way we passed abandoned portion of the 1950's paved road, and occasional portions of the 1940"s dirt road. Some portions of early Route 66 road were apparently one lane wide with a concrete curb on either side and a dirt shoulder so the drivers could pull partially off the road when there was oncoming traffic. Fortunately, back then, cars weren't driving 80 mph on the road. Robert Mock and son Daniel, who was in school earlier in the day. Met up with us that evening at the Stage Coach 66 Motel where we spent the night. It was rustic 50's hotel but the rooms by the tracks were vibrated when train went by!

The next morning we met up with Jerry & Mary Bruce who drove up from Prescott and all of us had a wonderful breakfast at the 50's Lilo's Café. The group then headed out about 9;30 am on Old Route 66 to Kingman, ahead of the giant parade of cars. On this drive we passed Grand Canyon Caverns. Peach Springs, Truxton, and Valentine, stopping at Hackberry, an historic former silver mining town which takes it name from a hackberry tree in a nearby spring. While visiting the old Hackberry General Store which remains in operation as a curio shop, we took the group and interior photos and then it was on to the car show in Kingman. Lunch was served at Mr. D's Route 66 Diner, a 50's diner with burgers, sandwiches, shakes, malts and floats.

Round 3:00 pm the folks staying in Lake Havasu left Kingman for the Islands Suites which turned out to be a fabulous hotel. Dinner was at Romano's restaurant where we had a very wonderful meal with a great group of friends. On Sunday morning we all headed home to the Valley. Overall it was a great weekend. We enjoyed historic and scenic locations in Arizona, as well as companionship of some great friends.


