SO YOU WANT AN ARIZONA COLLECTOR CAR PLATE



For years the school children in Arizona have been taught the Five C's: Copper, Cattle, Cotton, Citrus, and Climate. All five are strong economic forces in Arizona. We have the Copper mines like you have probably seen in Clifton and Morenci. And you have seen Cattle grazing in the mountains in the desert. Yes, the desert. They actually eat prickly pear cactus. Cotton grown in vast fields around the desert areas. We have large citrus groves like you see in Yuma and still some places in Mesa. And, of course, we have the great climate which attracts all of the winter snowbirds. So, when it came time to design special license plate for collector cars, it should not be a surprise that the legislature required that those plates be made with not just any copper, but only Arizona Copper! And the legislature created three specific copper plates for three different types of vehicles: ARS 28-2482, horseless carriage plates. The plates must be manufactured from Arizona Copper. "Horseless carriage" means a motor vehicle manufactured in or before 1915. Does that include a buckboard or the Budweiser wagon? No. Those are Horse Carriages and don't use those plates. ARS 28-2483, "classic car" plates. The plates must be manufactured from Arizona Copper. "Classic car" means a car included in the classic car club of America list. That list which is rather lengthy, includes specific cars between 1915 and 1948. The only Ford company manufactured vehicles on the list are specific Lincolns between 1920 to 1942 and all Lincoln Continentals 1939 to 1948. Therefore, Ford Thunderbirds do not qualify for classic car plates even though you might be member of the Arizona Classic Thunderbird Club. ARS 28-2484, "historic vehicle" plates. The plates must be manufactured from Arizona Copper. "Historic vehicle" bearing a model year date of original manufacture that is 25 years old or older. Therefore, all 55 to 57 Thunderbirds qualify for historic vehicle plates even though they are truly classics in all sense of the word. And yes, by this definition a 1998 Volkswagen can have the same type of copper plates as your Thunderbird even though most folks would say "really, those Volkswagens have no class". And No, retro-birds can't have a Historic Vehicle plate because they

simply aren't old enough. What conclusion can we draw from this? When it comes to the Classic Car copper license plates, our 55-57 Thunderbirds, as Rodney Dangerfield would say, "Get no respect."

This year's Barrett-Jackson Auction sold 13 "55-"56 and "57 Thunderbirds including Lot #717,1 a custom built 1957 equipped with a new custom-built full-length steel frame and powered by a 302ci V8 engine driven though an automatic transmission. It has power rack & pinion steering, power disc brakes, air conditioning and heating system. This vehicle has an all-new leather interior with padding, a full instrument panel, tinted windshield and power windows, as well as a removable hardtop with port holes (no soft top). Other highlights include an AM/FM stereo package, custom wheels, tires, and cruise control. **TILED AS 1957 FORD SPECON**

Looking at the most recent 11 years I have data for, the average Thunder-bird at Barrett-Jackson is just under 20. So 12 authentic '55, '56, and '57 Thunderbirds are only 60% of the 11 year average. Premium price provokers

While doing some collector-vehicle pricing research based on actual prices, we noticed several descriptive words or phrase that seller (often collector-car dealers or brokers) use to provoke successful sales and higher process. Soome of these descriptions are worthy of discussion, because various people interpret them in different ways.

"LOW MILES" We repeatedly came across instances where prices for a certain year, make and model of car with a low odometer reading were up to double the price of identical car with higher mileage. The cosmetic condition of the cars was virtually identical, and even the description of the mechanical condition was the same. In some cases, the low mileage and higher-mileage were even the same colors and had the same drivetrain, the same options and the same interior package.

We understand that low miles may mean bragging rights at a club meeting or car show, but truth is that a car can be a lemon when it's brand new. We once picked up a new company car—a 1969 Mercury Montego six-cylinder sedan at a dealership in Brooklyn and drove it home to Staten Island. When we shut it off, ut wouldn't refire. The starter had already gone bad. (To make matters worse, the Ford service techs were on strike.)

Three years later, the company upgraded to two-door cars and allowed us to add extras if we paid half the price of the options. (I suppose well-optioned cars had a better resale value three years later.) We ordered a gold Pontiac Lemans two door hard-top with a V-8 and a white vinyl top. Again, we drove it about ten miles from the dealership to our home. We shut it off and tried to start it to no avail. The starter was good; the engine was just "new and tight" the dealer said. We drove the car for two years and it was always hard to start.

Storing a vehicle for many years may keep the odometer low, but it can cause gaskets and seals to dry out and require replacement. Meanwhile, a higher-mileage car that is regularly used has proven its reliability. As mechanical objects, both will eventually require maintenance and repairs, but how far ahead will you be with the lowermileage example over the higher-mileage counterpart? Only time will tell. Some restorers reset the odometer when restoring a car, then they advertise it's a low -mileage car. It's true that the rebuilt or new engine might have only a few miles of use, but the rest of the car, even it nicely restored, is no longer a low-mileage specimen. It might look new, but all of its metal components, from the sheet metal to the engine block, still have more miles of stress from additional road use. In other cases, claims of low-mileage readings are based on what a previous owner told the current owner. However, years ago, odometers only had six figures (seven with the digit for the fractional miles), and many cars were well maintained that they looked good, even when the 1000,000-mile mark was passed and the odometer went back to 000001. The present owner may truly believe that the car has low-mileage when it's actually on its way to 2000,000 miles.
