I did not know much about vintage cars growing up, as I was more interested in sports, going to college, getting a job etc. I did however, have in the back of my mind someday owning one. The thought always eluded me during the years. Would I ever have the opportunity to afford a vintage car and to care for it?

That being said, fast forward to 1984 when my wife and I along with our newborn daughter moved into a cramped apartment on Long Island in NY. One day while walking across a supermarket parking lot, I noticed the most beautiful looking light blue 1957 Thunderbird passing right in front of me. At that moment I said to myself 'that's the car I want.' That vision stuck in my head for most of my adult life. I began going to car shows, speaking with the owners of Thunderbirds in an attempt to gain knowledge and hoping my opportunity would come to actually own one of these iconic cars. Years went by and fortunately I was able to retire in 2016. I said to my wife, 'now's the time'. I took a part of my retirement that accumulated for unused sick and vacation time and started the search.





At first, we discussed what color. We wanted that same sky blue one I saw way back in 1984 in the parking lot and I found one on-line that was owned by a woman who bought her car off a corner lot in Taos, NM. She had moved to Los Angeles with her daughter to pursue a career in entertainment and left the car on a lift in a garage in Taos. She sent me pictures and upon further review and discussions with her mechanic I told her I won't be buying her car. It needed a lot of work and it hadn't been started in a very long time. At that time, we were snowbirds traveling between AZ and PA. As we were going back east for the summer, still on the hunt for a Tbird, we went to Florida to visit my wife's sister. I found another one on-line in Coconut Beach, FLA. I phoned the owner and said I'm interested and the next day went to see it and BOOM that was it. It wasn't the sky blue one but, this one was yellow with both tops, restored by his uncle who had passed recently. That night we discussed the negotiated price and the next morning phoned the owner and bought the car on March 27th 2017. I quickly arranged for the car to be transported back to Mesa where my son and future daughter-law were living in our winter house at the time to receive the car when it came. When we came back to Mesa from PA that winter, there it was in the garage and that's when it hit me. I actually fulfilled my dream of owning a vintage Thunderbird. Wow!

When I joined ACTC and CTCI, I sent away for the original invoice from Dearborn, MI. When it came back (VIN # D7FH150018) my car was manufactured on November 26 of 1956 making it a true (Early Bird) 1957 model. It was built with power brakes, power steering and power windows. Well now it's all back to standard features. Little did I know that the previous owner did not restore the car back to the way it came off the factory-line. Maybe he was unaware of what it was supposed to be. It never occurred to me to ask the owner how he obtained it, rookie mistake, I guess.

Anyway, the car now is my pride and joy. It's a driver and that's what I wanted (I have driven it nearly 6,000 miles since mid-2017). Going to car shows and events with my fellow members has been wonderful and I look forward to many more years of enjoyment driving this yellow (Inca Gold) bird with my family and friends.

Tech Facts

CTCI Judging Rules (101/102) that can help you to Improve your T-Bird.

Many of our members have either already had their Tbird's officially judged at one of the annual conventions of the CTCI or plan to in the future. This may be especially true considering the next CTCI convention in joint with the VTCI will be in our own backdoor (Flagstaff, AZ) planned for September 05-09th, 2026 and part to the 100th Anniversary of Route 66 that runs right through Flagstaff). This article provides an abbreviated 101/2 tutorial on how the judging categories work and what the team of judges specifically look for in making their decisions.

First things first; You must decide in what category you want your T-Bird judged. If it is a daily driver you can still be judged in any category (just be sure your car is 100% detailed before being judged). If your car is 100% original and clean, go for the Gold Authentic. As most are not 100% original, go for Gold in the Non-Original category. If you just like to drive your car plenty and it needs a few items try being judged in the Touring Class.

Note: As much as most of us want to think our T-Birds are medal winners or at least in pretty good condition to contend, you may be surprised by what a team of 3-5 knowledgeable judges may find wrong with your beloved T-Bird. It is important when being fairly judged (yes, they do on occasion make mistakes), just how much you may learn about your car in ways to improve it in the future.

The Judging Categories:

Touring: Hood-Up or not

Concourse-I Original or Non-Original with undercarriage evaluated or not.

Concours-II Original or Non-Original

Display Only (No judging)

In all judging categories it's much about "Workmanship" (Concours-I Non-Original it is an absolute). Here is a list of what the judges are looking for:

- ⇒ Body fit & finish (paint, seam fit, damage, rust, panel alignment, etc.)
- Under carriage being clean and all components correctly in place, as well as oil leaks.
- All specialties (All instrumentation, lighting and comfort features in working order).

Historical Facts

Ford's leveraging of the Thunderbird as a Vehicle of Beauty & Value.

Ford Motor Company selected more than any other car model they sold, to promote various Ford products leveraged the early T-Birds, as well as some Thunderbird models to follow. Below is a prime example of a 1957 T-Bird as the focal promotional tag line in 1988/9: "beauty is more than skin deep" and the 1990, 1958 T-Bird "it could be 1958 forever". The advertisement for the Ford Pinto in 1970/71 comparing the resell value of a 1955 T-Bird that gained 2X its original

price by 1970, was a bit optimistic for a Pinto comparison.

It is clear that Ford fully recognized the value of the Thunderbird and its creatable time tested value in Ford's success many vears later.



As mentioned in the September-2025 ACTC newsletter, Ford has reregistered the Thunder-

bird name in late 2023. A good indication of a future.

It is clear that Ford is not putting the Thunderbird to rest. Rumors continue to surface about Ford producing the next generation Thunderbird, likely be sooner than later,

for a new Ford Thunderbird to return to the show room. However, in this author's opinion and others, Ford is likely struggling with three very important issues/decisions:

- 1.) Is the existing SUV centric market ready to accept once again vehicles categorized as Coupes and or Sedans?
- 2.) Should a new model Thunderbird be a Hybrid, EV and or ICE based power plant?
- 3.) Should a new Thunderbird be a two-seater or four-seater or...?
- 4.) Show the new design carry forward the design features of early Thunderbirds or provide a new design approach?

Ford was cautious to a degree; When Ford released the 2002-2005 Retro Thunderbird. The designers, marketeers and upper management did much correct in re-releasing the iconic and legendary original "Baby Birds" features/look. However, Ford also made a few unfortunate bad calls with this Retro Bird that cost longer term sales. Everyone has their own opinions as to what worked well and what did not. So I have listed Just a couple of rights and not so right decisions that have been noted from various articles and vehicle critics:

Positive/Accepted Retro Bird Decisions:

- \Rightarrow They did a reasonable job of capturing the original T-Bird with a flair of an updated look,
- ⇒ They gave the car a V8 Engine however, it did lack the expected performance numbers,
- ⇒ They provided for a removable hardtop with port hole windows and a soft-top.
- ⇒ They did provide an acceptable connivence package bordering on luxury.

Not so much- Accepted Decisions:

- ⇒ The large Chrome plated plastic front grill troubled some, this is where a polished aluminum or Stainless grill would have been much better received, giving the car a richer appearance,
- ⇒ The driver and passenger space/comfort was not up to par and overall space not much better (if at all), than the 55-57' models,
- ⇒ The handling performance was only OK, not great for a 2000-2010' decade car.

Remembering that the 2002-2005 Retro Bird did sell 68,095 units in those nearly four years (55-57's sold 53,166 units in total), not bad for this new market segment. Whereby, the Mazda Miata in the same Retro T-Bird four years sold just over 23,000 units, now that's interesting... However, the Corvette in the same four years sold 142,672 units. Or twice the Retro T-Bird sales. Therefore, the Retro T-Bird did not meet Ford's sales ex-



pectations. Worst, was that the sales were dipping with each year offered, not a good trend.

The point here, Ford has plenty on its table to take into consideration how best to leverage the Thunderbird name and future vehicle to successfully better its future image and sales. It is not an easy task to reproductize such an American iconic automobile, especially in a fast changing automobile environment. We can bet that Ford will better scrutinize the next Thunderbird design and marketing approach when it plans a released.

The final word, even thought resale prices for the Retro T-Bird have been lower than expected. There are a few shinning stars to mention, E.g the 2003 — 007 James Bond models are now bringing \$29K to \$35K. In addition, the number of Retro T-Bird resales are rising and the CTCI and VTCI are also seeing a rise in member ownership numbers.

- ⇒ Interior fit & finish
- ⇒ In Trunk and under Hood fit & finish
- ⇒ The engine compartment (clean, undamaged and hosting correct components do really matter)
- ⇒ Chrome appointments (pitting, wore and pealing chrome are unacceptable)
- ⇒ Back and front windshields and seals/ gaskets
- ⇒ Lastly, that the cars Data-plate/VIN match the vehicles ownership registration.

The above, plus optional under-carriage judging is **Concours-I Non-Original.**

For <u>Concours-I Original</u> judging, "Authentication" is added and counts even more so than workmanship, any added feature(s) inclusive of:

⇒ Commonly found: Air-conditioning, Disc-brakes, Upgraded Radio and modified Valve covers, as well as,

- ⇒ Rearview mirror hanging dice,
- ⇒ Too many window stickers, 1-3 is preferred,
- ⇒ No Bumper stickers,
- ⇒ Cup holder and non-factory center consoles,
- ⇒ Inconsistent features left to right sides

Non-conforming screws

Poor Workmanship (Paint difference)



- ⇒ Any added feature (s) (dealership or other), is not permitted, inclusive of wheel size change and or covers & non-factory optioned rims.
- ⇒ Hardtop to body deck protectors, even if of the plastic or wrapped transparent type.

In the <u>Concours-I & II Original</u>, it's mostly about "Authenticity", judges want to see our Tbird's as it came from the Ford Factory. In example: The wrong brake peddle cover could cost you a point.

Lastly, as in the picture below-right (2025 CTCI Judging) shows: When a judge or judging team arrives to evaluate your car. You must be present. You will be asked to open doors, hood, trunk and be instructed to turn on and off each elec-

trical or vacuum feature, as well as start your car.

The judges are instructed not to touch your car. If your car will not start, you might be dis-qualified from judging. Keep in mind your car must be driven onto the judging grounds and therefore, can not be towed.



Disclosure: This information is only a small subset of the actual CTCI Judging criteria/process.

November 27th, 2025 Fountain Hills Thanksgiving Veterans Parade


(Important!) Requesting a few move cars/drivers for the Veterans Parade.

BOOKING A HOTEL ROOM




ACTC Apparel Still Available for Sale
