Tech Facts

A Few Tech Tips How to minimize excessive Valve wear and keep your engine performance high.

In the Summer edition of the newsletter within the Tech Facts section the subject of using the correct fuel for your engine was highlighted, as you might recall. The compression rating of your engine really does matter when it comes to fuel. Taking this understanding further; it also matters what type of fuel you chose to replenish that empty tank on your Tbird or any car for that matter. This article addresses the type of fuels to use and the results you can expect.

AAA Club concluded a two-year study that set out to see if paying a few cents more per gallon is actually worth the normally added price/gallon associated with "Top-Tier" fuel. The picture below clearly shows the results/evidence of using Top-Tier versus non-Top-Tier fuels. As you can see, the Top-Tier fuels keep the engines values much cleaner. (*Testing used several cars and accumulated*—

Historical Facts

Ford's Thunderbird becomes their Centerpiece. By Walt Bonneau

Ford released this advertisement (see below), in 1955 to highlight the significance of the newly released Thunderbird. The Thunderbird with all of its features and it's new exceptional V8 "Y-Block" power and torque along with the stylish design elements were carried over to their mainstream/core car models for 1955/56. Looking at the advertisement, it is easy to see how their Fairlane, Etc. models were adorned with Thunderbird styling and drivetrain components. This in itself speaks volumes as to just how satisfied Ford management was with the new "Tbird". The Tbird be-



came the centerpiece of Ford's 1955-1957 cars. These carried over T-Bird features truly helped their sedans and wagons to sell more cars. Understanding that in 1952, Ford needed new excitement in its product offering. Simply put, Ford relied on the new exciting Tbird to help sell its Fairlane, Customline, Mainstream, Ranch Wagon, Country Squire and Country Sedans. After all, these models were the core of Ford's high-volume car sales and therefore, essential to it's bottom-line.

(Historical Facts)

In 1955 Ford manufactured a total of 1,451,157 cars of which, 16,155 were Tbirds, or 1.2% of Ford's total car sales and the Fairlane selling 626,250 cars taking 56.5%. Ford clearly understood their mainstream business. There were many more available buyers for sedans and wagons, due to the new baby boomer generation having young families to tote around, than the need for an individual small-coupe addressing a personal sporty luxury two-seater. The Thunderbird was about adding excitement to the Ford car line-up. That said; Ford was very surprised early-on in 1954 when they received within the first month or pre-sales, 3,500 pre-ordered new 1955 Tbirds. Ford had set a sales goal of 10,000 Tbirds to be sold in 1955 and so tooled up for this volume. By September of 1954 they realized that this little Tbird was not just an inspiration and excitement for its other models but, a success unto it own right. Sales exceeded expectations by 39% and by far surpassed any other two-seater available in the USA including the Corvette. The Tbird gave Ford a new light on racing and sporty cars in general.

We really do not know for sure just how many more Ford sedans, wagons and coupes were sold because of the Tbird's influence. It is clear it was significant if you ask the marketing department. Ford needed this boost in car sales excitement especially in light of Chevrolet's introduction in 1955 of the all new Belair being offered with a new V8 engine and a clean attractive design, giving serious competition toward Ford.


A few facts to back this up:

Ford in 1954 sold a total of 1,165,942 <u>cars (not counting trucks)</u>, not a bad sales year overall but, competition was hitting Ford hard with new models during the 1953-1957 period. However, in 1955 Ford sold 1,655,068 cars, a 41% increase in car sales. Chevrolet sold a total of 1,700,000 cars in 1955. The Chevy Belair was the significant boost for GM-Chevrolet selling 770,000 units. The Belair outsold the Fairlane model by 143,750 units. By the end of 1956, GM controlled 45% plus of the new car market, while Ford was at 31%.

Once again Ford made significant improvements to the Tbird in the 1957 model while adding a few new Fairlane models. Results; It was not until 1957 did Ford <u>car sales</u> overtake GM's top brand (since 1935), selling 1,522,406 car units to Chevrolet's 1,515,177 units, a difference of only 7,229 cars. The Thunderbird in '57 captured for Ford the top car sales position-percentage increase at 36%, for any new model measured against the previous year of sales. Tbird volume had increased by 5,749 units. The Fairlane-500 and new Fairlane based Rancho added improved sales to also help give Ford the sales lead.

(Note: In 1957 total US Market car sales had dropped a surprising 10% as the economy started to cool down. Remember, 1958 a small recession hit the US economy but again, Thunderbird for 1958 sales soared to 37,892 units. Ford still managed to lose its lead over GM as the newly introduced Edsel line-up failed miserably and also hurt it mainstream Fairlane 500.)

It truly seemed as if those little Tbird's became the car where the tail wagged the dog!

(Tech Facts)

It was determined that a car's engine intake values using <u>Non-Top-Tier fuels</u> in both older and newer cars can dirty the valves by 19 times because, it contains fewer detergents, which allows oily residues, gum, and varnish to build up on engine components, leading to performance issues over time. <u>Top- Tier gasoline</u> has a higher concentration of detergents that keep the intake valves, injectors, and combustion chamber cleaner, reducing the buildup that can cause rough idle, poor performance and poor fuel economy, and other problems.

When varnish and gum accumulation: The less-detergent-rich fuels allow more gum and varnish from the fuel to build up on the back of the intake valves. In addition, recirculated blow-by: Oil vapors and sludge from the engine's crankcase are recirculated back into the combustion chamber and can bake onto the intake valves, especially with direct-injection engines, exacerbating the problem.

AAA tested a few different gasoline suppliers of Top-Tier and found Chevron with Techron TM yielded very good results. However, some of the other brands also exhibited good results. Some noted were: ARCO, Shell, Texaco, Sunoco and yes, Costco fuels. Yes, you can buy slightly cheaper fuel that is not Top-Tier rated and add products like Techron. In a bottle (which works). However, what you will conclude after doing a little math, it is just as cost effective if not more so, to purchase a trusted Top-Tier fuel to begin with. The additives (average cost \$7.99), this does not save you money when filling up with 15 gallons of gas... In addition, companies such as Chevron have carefully blended just the right amount of detergents to run effectively for both older and newer cars.

Your Intake Valves and how Top-Tier Fuel helps your Engine

- It cleans fuel injectors (*If you added these to your Tbird*): Top-Tier gas contains higher levels of detergents that help prevent deposits and cleans existing deposits on the fuel injectors.)
- Reduces carbon buildup: It helps keep Intake-valves, piston crowns, and combustion chambers cleaner compared to regular gas.
- Improves performance: A clean engine performs better, can lead to better fuel economy, and can reduce emissions while increasing the engines life cycle..

Note: Change your oil regularly: Use a high-quality oil to also help minimize carbon buildup and PVC system failures.

Directly speaking: Top-Tier Fuel doesn't help the engine's PVC System per say

- The PCV system is responsible for recirculating crankcase vapors back into the intake to be burned, which can contain oil and other byproducts.
- Top-Tier gas additives are primarily designed to clean the fuel system and combustion chamber, not the oil and other vapors that are processed by the PCV system.
- The PCV system is a separate system from the fuel delivery system.

The Right Fuel for your Tbird

In conclusion, be sure to select Top-Tier fuel and octane rating for your specific T-Bird. In example; a 1955 with a 292 CID may perform just fine on 87 or 89 Octane. Not the case, for the higher compression 1957 312 CID that requires 91/92 Octane fuel. You might be able to run 89 octane if, you are not too demanding of your engine's power.

What a History/Relationship of Virginia's 1955 Torch Red Tbird after 70 years?

The photos below are a wonderful indication of the long relationship that ACTC member Virginia Snyder (Shultz) had with the 1955 Tbird her father purchased for her and her sister as a high school graduation gift. Having a price tag of \$4,049 meant this was no stripped Tbird from the get go. I am sure many of us in the ACTC could only image how significant it would have been for your father to buy you a well equipped new Tbird in April of 1955, or any year for that matter. Most Tbirds in 1955-57 were purchased by celebrities, married couples or just plain well to do buyers, a high priced car.

I once asked Virginia if her Daddy every took her Tbird away (1964 Beach Boys song "Fun, Fun, Fun". She really made me laugh when she said; "No, but he should have!" She added, the boys would follow her and her best friend around and always wanted to race her Tbird, and Oh... and I never lost."

The Tbird was driven 30,000 miles before it got stored until 1979 after Virginia married Gene Snyder and moved to Tempe, Arizona. in 1959. He passed away in the 1980's. The car was left back in Iowa in storage for 20 years. In 1979 she was rejoined with her old friend (55" Tbird) and drove the car to Arizona to be enjoyed once again. Virginia has been a member of ACTC since before 1980.

The article to the right, published in 1983 in the Tempe Gazette and re-published in the 1996 ACTC Chatter Newsletter provides for a wonderful 70 year relationship/history with this little Tbird.

Thunderbird for his two daughters, Virginia and Shirley. The stoker price was \$4,049.21. Virginia was graduating from high school the next year, and the car was a graduating gift that both girls would be able to drive. But Virginia was the sister who drove the car the most. "My frend Sharon and I used to cruise Main Street in the evenings." Snyder says. "It was great. The boys would honk and then follow us for miles, sometimes all the way home. That little car was part of me."

Her father agrees. "Virginia was the goer."

Virginia graduated in 1956 and married Gene Snyder. The couple moved to Arizona, leaving the car behind. Her dad did to the like-new hunderbird what he had done to his other 25

nt into mothballs and every year after while it sat

on blocks.

He replaced some minor parts while the car was mactive, including a rusted tallapse corroded by condensation that settled there from periodic start-ups of the engine. Shultz says the car received the same care it would have gotten if it had been setting in a museum.

Virginia Snyder went back to Griswold in 1979 and book possession of the car. "It was like meeting an old friend after all those years," she says. She drove the 27-year-old car in the centennia parade, then brought it to Arizona.

The 55'now resides in Indiana with ACTC members Gary and Jamie Thompson who purchased Virginia's 55" in 2004 and moved it to Indiana in 2006. It is currently finishing a significant restoration and should be ready soon to drive. Jamie mentioned that the 55' still has its original factory Torch Red paint and has no plans to repaint it or sell it.


ACTC Apparel Still Available for Sale
